The 25-year-old has **settled in** at her new job as a teacher at a local nursery school and looks forward to starting a family with her fiancé.



⁵ Why did you pick the UK?

I thought it'd be a great opportunity to brush up my English. And I was hoping that the two-year work experience abroad would give me an edge in job seeking when I come back.

Is it difficult to apply for the visa? Are there any special requirements?

There is **red tape** involved in applying for the visa, but not too much and it's easily sorted out. You need a valid passport and at least HK\$18,257 (or £1,890) in your bank account.

How did you find the job you are doing? What do you think about it?

A recruitment agency set me up for an interview with the school. It suits me well and my colleagues are great. I couldn't ask for more.

Have you taken advantage of the holiday part? What was your best adventure?

I've been to a few European countries, but my favourite was the 10-day trip I spent with my fiancé in Romania. It changed my views on Romanian cuisine, and the tour to Dracula's castle was a big tick off the **bucket list!**

Try to make the most of your years abroad; don't just see it as a break from the hustle and bustle of Hong Kong, or a way of financing your travel.

Eager to experience western culture first-hand, the young accountant quit his job to join the scheme. He has since visited Paris, Amsterdam, Brussels and many small towns in the UK.



How did you apply for the scheme?

I enrolled on it with my HKSAR passport. Unlike BNO passport holders, I had to get a Certificate of Sponsorship from the Hong Kong government before booking an appointment with the visa application centre to drop my application form and the required documents.

Was it difficult to find jobs?

Well, there are always side jobs in coffee shops and retail outlets, but full-time and **permanent** roles are rare. I was lucky enough to land a full-time accounting job at a local firm. The same cannot be said for all working holiday makers.

What do you think is the best part of the scheme?

Definitely the weekend getaways in Europe. A flight to Barcelona can cost as little as £60. Even if you don't scoop up those amazingly cheap deals, you can still **criss-cross** the continent on Megabus for a reasonable price, as fares rarely top £20.

Would you recommend other young people to join the scheme?

I think it's a brilliant opportunity for those who have a burning desire to travel and live abroad. It will take you out of your comfort zone and give you a new **perspective** on not just the country you are visiting, but on life in general.





Structure

Interview-based feature articles can be written in many ways. The writer considered the questions on the right when writing the article in this unit.

Introduction

Introduce the topic.

- What is the article about?
- Who were interviewed?

Interviews

Give details about the topic.

- Who are the interviewees? What do they do?
- What is special about their working holiday experiences?
- Do they have any advice for readers interested in the scheme?

Techniques the writer used

- 1 Including short profiles of the subjects
